Current CRHD Projects

Interdisciplinary Collaboration and Cultural Transformation Model Project (ICCTM)

A multi-phase five year community initiated Mental Health Services Act (MHSA) innovation project that focuses on key cultural and linguistic competencies required to successfully highlight the experiences and mental health needs of the Filipino American, Latino, and LGBTQ+ communities, specifically in the Solano County.

California Reducing Disparities Project (CRDP)

A six (6) year statewide prevention and early intervention effort to reduce mental health disparities in underserved communities: African Americans; Asian Pacific Islanders; Latino; LGBTQ+ and Native American / Alaska Natives.

CRHD is providing technical assistance to the CRDP Latino Pilot Projects. CRDP currently has seven (7) Implementation Pilot Projects in California that are focused on the Latino community, implementing community-defined practices and strategies to reduce mental health disparities.
